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ACCEPTABLE USE- THE BOTTOM LINE

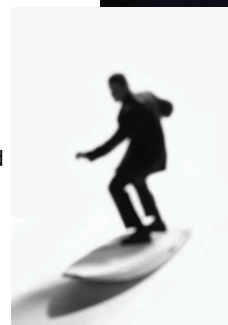
There have been so many differing versions of what this should be and is in so many classrooms around the city it makes my head spin. The fact is, there's only one set of rules that is really important and it can be found at this address;

To put it very bluntly, there is no "Oh, but this is the way I do it in my classroom" sort of stuff. We all have to follow the same rules and all have to deal with the same consequences of our actions.

The policy is very clear about what we can, and cannot, do with regard to our (and our student's) use of the internet service at school for an educational alternative to traditional means of instruction and research. Please read it out loud with your students if you intend to surf the "net".

I understand that this doesn't sound like the generally genial, jovial, jolly



kind of guy I normally am, but I really do have to impress the importance of the SPS's "Acceptable Use Policy" on everyone. Please give it a thorough read and make sure your students are familiar with it as well.

HSC IN-HOUSE WORKSHOPS

Beginning next Monday (1/8/2007), I'll be offering (on a purely voluntary basis) some different PD that folks have asked me about over the course of the last few months. The sorts of questions that people bring to the room (B155) will be the topics that we'll cover (in addition to the basics of a subject area just to get started).

I'll be setting aside the first two blocks of every day over the course of time I have listed for folks to come in for individual work or small groups.

The first few sessions have been planned out specifically for folks who want to use the laptop carts on a regular basis (or at least as much as sharing will allow). "PC Basics" and "Laptop Cart Training" are a definite must have for the fledgling technology using teacher.

Let me point out why we're not offering PDP's for this right at the moment. PDP's can only be awarded in blocks of 10 contact hours. While you'll notice that there are actually 10 different subjects and at least an hour's worth of work to be done (by any reasonable standard), I'd

have to track your attendance over the rest of the year (regardless of whether you took 5 workshops for 2 hours or ten of the mini units for one hour).

In each workshop, we'll talk about planning, use, and all the sorts of stuff you'll need to walk away with something you can actually use in your classes. I'd like this to be something you will get theory AND practical knowledge from.

GETTING UPDATES

You know, over the last several months I've been back here at the good old' High School of Commerce one thing has been brought to my attention over and over again. People say to me, "I couldn't open that foolish Teacher's Survey thing". All that means is the fact that you need to update your version of the program (documents created in newer versions of a program will sometimes have problems in previous versions, it's that sort of thing)

Please make sure your Adobe Acrobat Reader is updated with the latest version (I think it's # 7 now). Don't worry, It's free! Just click here...

Follow the directions they give you and everything should be fine. Once you've done that for yourself, help out the folks near you do the same thing. I know it's my job to do that, but it's also my job to help build collegiality too. If we can all help each other out just a little bit, it'll make everyone's job a smidgeon easier.

Don't forget, Acrobat Reader updates often (maybe once or twice a year) and it's not the only software that

does this either. You should check for updates on other software that we use frequently here at the HSC. One that comes to mind is Grade Keeper. Lots of folks are still using the old versions of the program.

Don't get me wrong here folks, the older versions are familiar and we're comfortable with them. I understand that. However, think about all the improvements that could have been made to your favorite piece of software. In the case of Grade Keeper, the changes have been very good. Here are some of them:

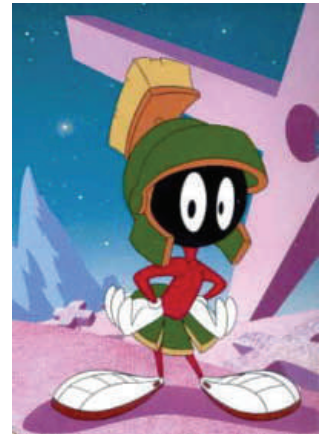


Version 6.0 (the current version for download) makes the following improvements:

- Added export to [SchoolFusion](#)
- Added a Curve Assignment command
- Can import and export student comments
- Can export school, subject, current term,

and teacher

- Import matches student names and IDs to existing students
- Export to web translates special characters and makes links live
- Fill Down and Fill Across give option of not replacing existing scores
- Can choose to display student grades as percent or letter grade or both
- Student scores report category summary includes points earned and possible
- Can choose individual, school, or district license when entering registration code
- The class grades report will now always include semester and year-end final exams
- The multiple class report may now include attendance and a summary of assignments



These two are only a small portion of the programs that update on a fairly regular basis. I try to check for updates every couple months or so in the programs I use frequently.
