Multimedia and Classroom Management

"Safety and some of the rules of the road"...or... "What use is common sense?"

You know, over the last several weeks I've noticed a number of things that I'm sure all of us are finding somewhat troubling. I understand that I told you all I'd be speaking about the uses of video in the classroom and the "instructional block" this week (you can skip ahead to page 2, but I think this is going to be something you'll want to know as well). I haven't forgotten. I just made the decision to speak about safety and securing the contents of your rooms as best you

One of the things we have to realize is, if we don't have anything thieves will value, they won't be around. Conversely, when we do have something of value, they'll be sniffing around like Homer on a doughnut.

For the most part, the machines we have in our rooms (my office is certainly an exception) are

junk and we couldn't even pay the thieves to take them away. However, bring in a laptop, even one that isn't necessarily state of the art, and you'll notice that there is a reason for folks, some of whom have never been in your class before, to show up. You now have something of value. Additionally, you'll notice people paying more attention to where you put your valuables (pocketbook, coat, briefcase, that sort of thing). Sound a bit paranoid? Not really. Considering the incidents that have occurred in the past several weeks, I don't think so.

Now that I've got you thinking, what can we do about it? Quite a bit really. Here are a few tips to get us all started:

The most important thing that we can do is something we can do for each other. Be aware of what's going on around you. Keep your eyes and ears open not only for your own benefit, but the folks around you as well. The more we take care of each other, the safer and more secure things will be for everyone. It's kind of hard to

- go running away with a laptop, or any of the other equipment that might be valuable, when "there's eyes everywhere".
- Make certain that anything of value is secured at all times. If you don't have a lock for your laptop (if you're using your personal machine), GET **ONE!**. They only cost about ten bucks and you can find them at Staples, Best Buy, CompUSA, Circuit City, Radio Shack, and just about any place where computers are sold. If you're using an SPS laptop, the tech department gives you one when they issue your laptop. Make sure you use it. If you need help with it, let me know.
- Students should **NEVER**:
 - be in a room unsupervised
 - be allowed to use teacher's keys to enter rooms w/o a teacher present
 - through connecting doors

Things that are available to us...part five...To blog or not to blog

The last time we were together, I was talking about blogs and what some of the rules of the road might be for your students. This time I'm actually going to let you in on some of the uses for blogs in the classroom.

One of the main points for using blogs is the ability to use what would be called Type 2 writing in the John Collins Writing method. Granted, blogging shouldn't

be about assessment, nor should it be about anything more than responding to a question in a thoughtful and well reasoned way.

Using blogs is all about the fostering of critical thinking and the uses to which a student's knowledge or opinion based on the assumption of knowledge can be used. They are a method of communication for students to give more reflective responses to questions that might require more than iust a hand raised in a classroom of hands raised. It is through the use of a blog where students can be "heard" in whatever manner they wish with whatever care they take making their "voice" known.

In our next issue we'll get down to the nuts and bolts of setting up a class blog and getting things running on the technical end of the spectrum.


Using both of these videos to illustrate situational techniques is an obvious choice, but by expanding the parameters of our questioning and expectations, we can also use the very same examples to demonstrate the visual techniques in "getting" the points raised by the use of the situational techniques already discussed.

A specific example of this might be in comparing the scene in <u>WDMC</u> where Williams recognizes the fact that he's dead and his dreams are his reality with Hamlet ruminating on what

happens after committing suicide in the soliloquy by saying, "For in that sleep of death, what dreams may come". The use of both scenes will certainly help to emphasize the importance and meaning of

the words Hamlet uses and the spiritual revelation on the part of William's character.

There are many more areas where we could make comparisons and contrasts, where we could use the imagery of the
